Through Campaign SightFirst II, Lions will continue to bring the gift of vision to untold millions. That gift could be for someone you know and love. Blindness plays no favorites, and because of the surge in diabetes and the aging of our population, loss of sight is a real threat even in developed nations such as the United States and Canada.

Lions have been Knights of the Blind since 1925 when Helen Keller urged us to embrace that mission. We've filled that role magnificently since then. But never has the need to protect and preserve sight been greater. The world's population is growing and people are living longer. As a consequence, more people are at risk of blindness. Diabetic eye disease also looms as a much more serious and pervasive threat because of changes in lifestyle worldwide. Unless action is taken now, the number of blind people could double to 75 million by 2020. We can't let that happen and we won't let that happen.

When Lions began SightFirst more than 15 years ago, we took a chance. We had never ventured on such a huge undertaking. We were confident Lions would support the first campaign and we had the same trust in ourselves to efficiently and effectively carry out the projects made possible by the donated funds. But we were entering uncharted



waters. We had no blueprint for such an ambitious initiative. We were successful, of course, far beyond what was imagined. Our success has been a wonderful testament to the can-do spirit of Lions, to our great spirit of service.

We now have a track record of carrying out a worldwide endeavor to save and restore sight. We know with a certainty that as we replenish the funds raised by the first campaign we will continue to develop and implement sight-saving projects that reach into the far corners of the globe. We must be successful with this campaign. If Lions don't reach out to save sight, no one else will be there to prevent vision loss. We Lions are the world's best hope for those threatened with life without sight.

So please support Campaign SightFirst II. Your support, however small or large, will help preserve or restore vision. It also will bring you that joy made possible only by helping others.

Highlights of the September Governor's Council Meeting

The first meeting of the 2006-2007 Council of Governors was held in Markham on Saturday September 23, 2006. The following represents the highlight topics discussed during the meeting:

Appointment of new MDA Secretary - Upon the recommendation of the Administration Committee, Council approved the appointment of PCC Dave Voisey as the new MD"A" Secretary, effective September 22nd 2006. The Council of Governors commended outgoing Secretary, Wayne Hoey, for his service to MDA during the past two years.

Correspondence - LCI acknowledged MDA's endorsement of the bid from the City of Toronto to host the 2012 International Convention.

Treasurer – Council approved adjustments to the Rules of Audit covering the Promotion Chair's attendance at Conventions to reflect the responsibilities contained in the job description. An increase in the MDA rules of audit for mileage was also approved increasing the rate from 22 cents per kilometre to 24 cents per kilometre (District A5 was proportionally increased from 23 cents to 25 cents to recognize higher northern costs). The MDA budget for 2006-2007 was presented and approved which included the guaranteed prize structure for the Effective Speaking contest. The Auditors Report for 2005/2006 was presented and approved.

International Director - ID Terry Graham advised that the second Canadian Faculty Development Institute is planned for February 14 to 19, 2007. Resulting from the highly successful USA/Canada Forum, ID Terry reminded Council that next year's forum is planned in Grand Rapids, Michigan on September 6 to 8, 2007. Also that clubs wishing to take advantage of the family membership rebates must have their requests in to LCI by November 30, 2006. Governors asked that the MDA Leadership coordinator under the MERL Team explore the possibility of holding a faculty forum just for MDA.

Research & Long Range Planning Committee – Council approved the Terms of Reference for a new Ad Hoc Committee established to conduct an overall review of the MDA Constitution and By Laws (C&BL) to ensure compliance with the current International C&BLs and its consistency with the MDA Policy manual and the MDA Council Motion Book.

Promotion Committee – The MDA delegate hotel in Chicago will be the Sheraton located approx 2.7 miles form the main convention centre. The approved band representing MDA in Chicago is the Brockville Lions Steel Band from District A4. Approval was received to replenish the MDA stock of Safari Shirts and to purchase 400 MDA 2006-2007 pins (Cardinal Bird). Authority was also given for existing non-or slow selling merchandise to be disposed at cost. At the request of the governors, the Promotion Committee is tasked to research the potential for organizing a Canada wide hospitality event at the International Convention (similar to those hosted by other international contingents).

Youth Outreach – the MDA Effective Speaking Contest for 2006-2007 will be hosted by District A711 and held at the Holiday Inn Select, Toronto on May 5th. The Youth Committee was asked to research the feasibility of applying for a \$2000 LCI Grant for conducting a Leo conference either sometime during this year or the next. Finally governor's approved the payment of rules of audit for the Peace Poster contest winner and family to attend the MDA convention and for the committee to approach MDA clubs for donations towards the MDA Peace Poster contest expenses. The contest theme for this year is "Celebrate Peace".

International Advisory Committee – confirmation was received that the criteria for International Presidential and Leadership medals would revert back to District Governor recommendations rather than being linked to the membership program as per last year. PID Art Woods also updated the Council on MDA donations to Sightfirst II, which, according to LCI presently stand at \$154,904 (although actual donations are anticipated to be almost twice that amount). **Environment** - This committee's objective will be to promote district environmental awareness and also MDA's participation in the annual International Environmental Photo contest.

Convention Committee - It was reported that all pre registrations made in Boston to attend the International Convention in Chicago were inadvertently destroyed and therefore re registration will be required. Plans for the upcoming convention in London (scheduled for May 25th - 27th) are well underway and the International Guest will be MDA's own International Director Lions Terry and Jean. The 2008 MDA Convention is scheduled for May 28 – June 1, 2008 at the Holiday Inn Select in Toronto.

Website – the new MDA website is hosted on servers in Bocca Raton in Florida (the change being necessitated due to the repeated difficulties experienced with the former provider,).

MERL – An Extension Workshop aimed at District MERL and Extension Chairs is planned by the MERL Committee for November 2 – 4, 2006 to be held at the Tiverton Lions Hall. The MERL Committee is also looking into the possibility of conducting another MERL Symposium sometime early in the New Year.

Committee Changes - Council approved PDG Dave Hansen as the new Promotion Chair, replacing PCC Dave Voisey who has taken over as MDA Secretary. Lion Lynn Mathewson has been approved as the Peace Poster coordinator assuming the duties from Lion Janice Murray who resigned due to family illness and PCC Judy Grant resigned as the Constitution and By Laws Chair also due to family illness related problems. Council Chair David Cole will recommend a replacement for PCC Judy and also appointing the membership of the new MDA Ad Hoc Committee shortly.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

Fund accounting

The International Association of Lions Clubs follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions.

General fund

The General Fund accounts for the organization's program delivery and administrative activities.

Restricted funds

Internally Restricted Funds report restricted resources that are to be used for specific programs as determined by the members of the Association.

Capital assets

Capital asset acquisitions are generally incidental and are written off in the year of acquisition.

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

Revenue recognition

Club dues are recognized as revenue in the year to which the related membership applies. Dues are billed based on the membership information provided by the Clubs.

A statement of changes in cash flow is not presented as it would not provide meaningful additional information.

The final plans were in place and the Host Lions of Ohio, welcomed 2700 Lions to the 30th USA/CANADA annual Lions Leadership Forum. 68 seminars and many outstanding speakers entertained and motivated the Lions. President Ross inspired everyone to return to his or her club and reinvent their clubs to help serve their communities with more projects. The pre-registrations for next years Forum in Grand Rapids, Michigan reached a record level of 1600 Lions. I would encourage all Lions in MDA to register for this forum. Next years Forum is only a short drive from most areas in MDA. So let's be the multiple with the most Lions attending the Forum.

At the Forum, the 5 star District Governors were announced. There were 30 awards in all of Canada, United States and Mexico. Two Governors from MDA received this prestigious award. They were A711's DG Rollando Dela Cruz and A9's DG Ferne Osborne. Congratulations to Lions of both Districts for their efforts in making 2005-2006 a very successful year. As both Governors said, "It was a District effort".

On September 30, we travelled to Lucknow to help charter the Dungannon & District Lions Club. The guests of honour were the 29 new enthusiastic Lions. IPDG Ferne Osborne was the governor when this club was officially chartered. 140 Lions from 4 Districts were in attendance to show the new Lions we are truly a caring and sharing Multiple. All the best to the new club.

We had the pleasure of travelling to Beijing to attend our fall International

Board meeting. The board meeting in Beijing was a new experience for Lion Jean and myself. The Lions of China were excellent hosts. With a population of 1.3 billion people and only having been allowed to form clubs in the last few years, we look for amazing growth in that part of the world. To date there are only 2500 Lions in China and you have to have the government's approval to join Lions. When I travel in the US or Canada, the age of the Lions is up in years. The Lions of China are very young and I believe our major growth over the next generation will be in this area of the world.

We visited the Forbidden City, Tiananmen Square, and the Great Wall. When we arrived in Beijing, we could see the Great Wall from the plane. But to stand on the wall was really something special. I couldn't imagine how many man-hours went into building something this size. It is definitely one of the great wonders of the world.

Of course, we went to China for the board meeting. Some of the resolutions passed by the board are as follows.

Each board meeting we have to approve the cancellation of Lions Clubs. With regret the board cancelled 172 Clubs for a total of 1,857 members.

Seven Multiple Districts applied for redistricting. All were approved. MD 41 in eastern Canada was approved for redistricting. The new number for the Maritime Provinces will be MDN. This means east of North Western Ontario, all Multiple Districts do not have Districts in the United States.

A request came to the board to review the Mileage allowance, which is currently US 0.26 cents per mile (US 0.16 per Kilometre). This will be



increased to US 0.28 per mile (US 0.173 per kilometre) effective January 1, 2007.

Approved 75 Standard, International Assistance and Core 4 grants totalling US\$2,999,396.00.

Approved an award for clubs that recruit 10 new family members before June 30, 2007, to be recognized with a Family Banner Patch and Districts that either recruit 30 new family members or charter a new family club receive a small diamond pin.

Consolidated the Lions Youth Exchange and International Youth Camp programs as a single "Lions International Youth Camp and Exchange Program" and change title of "Youth Exchange Chairperson" to "Youth Camp and Exchange Chairperson", Effective July 6, 2007.

As we approach this festive season, let us remember that the need for our service keeps growing and we are sometimes the only light that shines for families in our communities. Lion Jean and I wish extend to you and your family all the best over the holiday season and hope your goals are met in the New Year.

New Programs, New Opportunities, New Members

Three new programs will help Lions serve their communities better(and increase membership. "People want to be a part of what we're doing as Lions," said International President Jimmy M. Ross of Texas, United States. "So I'm asking you to offer Lionism to others. The more people we have in each Lions club, the more people we'll have to serve our communities. I'm asking you to bring in more new members in order to have more best friends."

Lions ALERT

When man-made and natural disasters occur, victims need food, shelter and other basic necessities. A community-wide plan of action can aid in providing assistance to disaster victims. The new Lions ALERT program encourages Lions club to create pro-active emergency plans for three levels of emergencies.

* A Level One emergency such as a house fire or a localized flood affects a few people. A single Lions club can aid those affected by providing basic necessities such as drinking water, food, shelter or clothing.

* A Level Two emergency affects a larger geographical area. A coordinated district response may be necessary to aid the victims of a tornado, hurricane, cyclone or mudslide. Government and other relief agencies may appear as first responders in a

Level Two emergency. Lions districts may be eligible to request a Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) Emergency Grant for a Level Two emergency.

* A Level Three emergency affects hundreds or thousands of people. A multiple district or several multiple districts may be involved in the relief efforts when a major catastrophic event such as a tsunami or an earthquake affects a region. Lions can work alongside government and other relief agencies such as the Red Cross to help victims of a Level Three emergency.

District governors and council chairpersons have been asked to encourage Lions to serve as community leaders in the organization of a local Lions ALERT team to develop a community-wide emergency response plan.

The chairperson of the Lions ALERT committee can meet with local government officials and emergency response professionals (firefighters, healthcare professionals, law enforcement personnel, transportation specialists, media representatives) to create a customized emergency response plan. In areas where an emergency response plan already exists, the ALERT chairperson can inform local officials of the availability of Lions volunteers in the event of a disaster. The names of Lions ALERT

chairpersons can be submitted to Lions International Headquarters for posting on the Lions Web site.

Every emergency situation has four separate phases: mitigation or disaster prevention, preparedness, response and recovery. After identification of the four phases, consider the volunteer opportunities that exist for your Lions club. For example, after the World Trade Center disaster, New York Lions mobilized their efforts and provided food and temporary shelter for relief workers at Ground Zero. Four years later, Texas Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center volunteers provided free replacement eyeglasses to Hurricane Katrina victims.

After development of a Lions ALERT plan, your Lions club can decide how to best serve the needs of your community in the event of an emergency. Examples of possible forms of Lions aid include: providing food for relief workers, arranging shelter for disaster victims and collecting basic supplies for disaster victims/transporting the supplies to the disaster-affected area.

Lions are generous with their time, talents, and resources. The Lions Web site also now includes the Lions List of Projects and Fundraisers. Reviewing the list can inspire clubs to begin new service projects, which, in turn, can lead to new members or even reinvigorate the passions of a current Lion.

Quite often, a new project or fundraiser will spark the interest of a particular Lion. For example, a Lion who likes to run marathons may delight in the opportunity to serve as chairperson for a Lions 5K run. To organize the project, the Lion seeks assistance from non-Lion friends who are runners. At the end of the 5K event,

potential new Lions may be waiting at the finish line.

Clubs that implement good service projects and fundraisers naturally attract new members.

An entry in a local parade is an easy method of raising community awareness of a club. Well-publicized projects include:

* the Geneva Lions Club, New York, United States, routinely organize hair donations for the creation of wigs for cancer patients

* the 20/20 Columbia Lions, Missouri, United States, organize a diabetes camp in the country of Georgia

* 18 Minnesota, United States, Lions clubs participate in a fishing trip for local seniors

* the First Flight Lions Club, North Carolina, United States, organized their 23rd Annual Outer Banks VIP Fishing Tournament for 500 visually impaired persons.

Financing service projects provides another opportunity to showcase the ingenuity of Lions. The Lions of District 31-J, North Carolina, sell 2,500 numbered golf balls to finance the cost of the district-wide three-day fishing tournament. A helicopter drops the golf balls, sold for \$25, over a golf course. The golf ball that comes closest to the hole reaps a US\$10,000 prize for its owner. The local newspapers and television stations willingly cover the event.

He then moved to the Treasury Board of Canada for nine years and upon retirement in 1995, he joined National Defence as a consultant and is currently concluding a short-term consultancy position with Foreign Affairs.

In his 23 years as a Lion, Lion Dave has received numerous recognitions at the club and district levels, including Helen Keller, Judge Brian Stevenson and, Melvin Jones Fellowships, two International Presidential Certificates and an International President's Medal. He is a Life Member of LFC and a Knight of the Blind for Sight First II.

Lion Dave has always enjoyed the full support of his wife Vivien while taking on his various Lionistic responsibilities. They have been married for 43 years and have three children and seven grandchildren.

As the Secretary for MD"A", Lion Dave eagerly awaits the challenges that go along with the responsibilities and is looking forward to providing support and assistance to the Council of Governors, MD"A" Committees and all members of the MD"A" family in any way possible..

First SightFirst Grants in Niger

The Lions Clubs International Foundation has recently added another country to its growing list of nations to receive funding through SightFirst grants. With the approval of two grants for Niger, SightFirst has given grants to assist 90 countries throughout the world. During an August meeting, the SightFirst Advisory Committee approved 25 grants for a total of \$2.9 million. Since SightFirst began giving grants in 1990, it has awarded over \$193 million.

The land-locked nation of Niger in West Africa is roughly double the size of Texas with a population of 12.5 million. It is one of the poorest countries in the world and ranks last on the United Nations Development Fund index of human development.

With one of the highest blindness rates in the world, it is estimated that 85 percent of blindness in Niger can be avoided or cured through the proper treatment. Despite the country's size and high levels of blindness, primarily due to cataract and trachoma, there are only eight ophthalmologists and 27 ophthalmic nurses in the entire country. The number of trained eye care

professionals in the country are far too few to care for the entire population, and the World Health Organization (WHO) estimates an additional 77 ophthalmic nurses need to be trained to meet the eye care needs of the country.

To address the ophthalmic nurse shortage in Niger, a SightFirst grant for \$127,551 has been approved to develop a three-year training program at the Lamorde National Hospital in Niamey, Niger. The curriculum is being developed by doctors with the Organization for the Prevention of Blindness in collaboration with WHO. SightFirst funds will provide for some academic materials for teaching the courses, upgrading rooms into suitable classrooms and providing the nurses with basic equipment upon graduation, in addition to other items. Upon graduating from the program, nurses will work at rural hospitals or health centers.

Conventions

ou might be asking yourself why at this time we feel it's important to bring up the subject of conventions, with the next convention still six months away. The answer is very simple. Each Club President looks forward to having a great year, and just maybe receive some recognition at the Annual Convention. To bring this about the groundwork must be laid by the President at the very beginning of his year. No really successful Club would fail to include in its planning the necessity of participating in District Conventions with its allowable quota of delegates. Everyone who attends the business sessions at a Convention and hears the address of an international officer, will realize what a powerful influence Lionism is around the world. The significance of our voting strength, properly exercised, therefore is quite obvious in the interest of all of our Lions, Lionesses, Leos and of our Clubs. The educational value to a Lion attending a Convention cannot be overemphasized. It's at Conventions that a Lion learns what Lionism really means and receives the inspiration to return to his Club with new ideas and a strong desire to contribute something more to his community.

At International Conventions, every Lions Club, in good standing with LCI, is entitled to one delegate and one alternate for every 25 members or major factor thereof. At MDA or District Conventions, every Lions Club in good standing is entitled to send one delegate or alternate for every ten members or major factor thereof. Sometimes we wonder, do we stress the importance of Conventions enough? How often have you heard "Oh, our club is not convention-minded". Maybe, at some time or other this club sent delegates who failed to give proper reports when they returned. You, as the President, should insist that such a report be properly given. Too frequently a delegate's report puts greater emphasis on the happenings of the traveling to and from the convention and the social aspects, rather than on the important business sessions affecting your Club and the District.

This brings us to a very important point - the choice of Official Delegates to represent your Club. Your Club is entitled to full value for every dollar is raises and spends to send Delegates to Conventions. If a Club is paying all or any part of the Delegates expenses it would seem logical to choose members who would have the interest and enthusiasm to bring back an intelligent report to the Club. Every District in MDA was created by action taken by delegates to a District Convention, and who will deny the fact that this is an important reason for having representation at a District Convention.

Today, relatively speaking, we do not have to take a backseat to any other Sub-District, but we cannot allow ourselves to become a poor relative. We must uphold our pride and dignity and match the other Sub-Districts, stride for stride. It is regrettable that attendance at Conventions is not one of the strong points but it is never too late to begin. This is a good time to start making plans. Let's face it Lions, it will cost money to send delegates. With the majority of our Clubs the problem is the lack of funds. There is six months left to build a Convention fund and planning must begin at once to provide your needs.

Lion President - this is your year and this is your Convention. Let's all resolve to prove our worthiness to wear this Lions Emblem by getting behind our District Governor, his Cabinet and his District Convention Committee.

Remember:

- Your Constitutional obligations to send Delegates to Conventions.
- The immediate appointment of a Convention Committee Chair.
- Start planning to raise Convention funds at once.
- Choose your Official Club Delegates very carefully.
- Make sure a complete official report is made to your Club immediately following the Convention.
- Have a Great Year.

Lions Help the CNIB Eye Van Bring Vision Health to Northern Communities

The Ontario Medical Mobile Eye Care Unit, commonly known as the CNIB Eye Van, has been bringing essential eye care services to northern Ontario communities since 1972. The Eye Van is a mobile, state-of-the-art ophthalmology clinic-on-wheels, with a rotating team of one volunteer ophthalmologist and two CNIB ophthalmic assistants. This team carries out vision-screening, treatment of eye conditions, minor eye surgery and raises awareness on eye disease and blindness prevention. Each year they reach approximately 5,000 people in 30 communities.

The CNIB Eye Van is often the only

opportunity for Northerners to be seen by an ophthalmologist. Of the patients screened, 90% are identified with eye conditions that could lead to blindness if left untreated. Therefore, this service has literally saved the eye sight of thousands of residents in northern Ontario.

This would not have been possible without the ongoing commitment and support of Lions and Lioness Clubs across northern Ontario. The Lions' generous support enables CNIB to bring essential medical eye care services to thousands of residents living in remote communities. On behalf of the people served, the Eye Van volunteer physicians, staff members and community volunteers, CNIB extends a BIG thank you to the Lions for their dedication and commitment to this program.



The Lions' support of the Eye Van goes well beyond any financial contributions the clubs make to this important initiative. Lions Clubs are like the Eye Van's "life line" in a community. 

Elliot Lake Fire






