Busy Lions

With nearly two decades of experience as a professional organizer, Julie Morgenstern is a veteran warrior on the front lines in the battle to manage time.

And if it seems like it's a tougher fight today than when she first began, that's no illusion.

"Life is more complicated," said Morgenstern, whose self-titled company provides consulting services to individuals and Fortune 500 companies, such as Microsoft, Sony and Delta Airlines. "There are infinite choices in every realm of our lives. It comes to this: You have to make those choices or it will overwhelm you."

The New York-based organizer can speak from experience. While Morgenstern was running her high-profile company, writing books, making television appearances, developing time-management products and working the speaker circuit, she was also raising a daughter, now 22. During those busy years, she volunteered for school functions and dance companies, where her daughter performed.

That trial by fire gave her perspective on how to manage career, family and service work. It also gave her fodder for several books including Time Management from the Inside Out. This helpful guide gives readers an easy-to-comprehend road map on how to rise above the chaos and take control of your schedule. It starts by developing a bigpicture view of what you want to accomplish in life, she said.

"That's the starting point. That view gives meaning, motivation and direction to your life," Morgenstern said. "It's your baseline, your springboard and your landing place for handling all of life's challenges."

If that big-picture view puts a high priority on volunteer work, then you need to develop a plan that allows you to pursue that goal without putting you on a collision course with time.

In an interview with THE LION, Morgenstern offers five valuable tips:

- 1. Make sure you've got a very reliable and consistent planner to capture 100 percent of your to-do list. "Don't be chasing your tail with different planners for different activities. It's got to be contained all in one," she said. "Post-it notes, scattered lists, assorted calendars that's a recipe for disaster."
- 2. Create a "time map" for the week. When you're scattered all over the place, you lost 30 to 40 percent of your time. Indecision leads to going off track. This chart would set aside specific time slots for the various departments in your life. Look at it carefully and make sure there's a balance for family, volunteer, work and kids. "And don't forget the self time," Morgenstern said.
- 3. Group similar tasks into one time slot. By doing that, you get more done in a less amount of time. For example, if you're chairing an event, block out a segment of your day to make phone calls, order the chairs and plan the menus. By focusing on one area, you're more likely to finish all the tasks before moving on to the next project.
- 4. Learn how to master your energy cycles. "Do the toughest jobs when you're the most awake," Morgenstern said. "For me, the creative time is in the morning. I leave the tedious jobs that don't require as much brainpower at my low peaks in the day."
- 5. Last, but not least, is to learn how to be a good delegator. You're not doing anyone any good by trying to do it all. A person who takes over everything to give the impression of being indispensable is asking for trouble. "You want to be indispensable? "Morgenstern said. "Then get involved in six projects. That doesn't mean take them over it just means to get involved." A volunteer who is a team player in several projects will actually have more time to spare than a person who attempts to control and micromanage every aspect of a single project.

SightFirst Grants Given; Total Tops \$211 Million

he SightFirst Advisory Committee approved 14 grants totaling US\$6.2 million in August. Since SightFirst began giving grants in 1990, it has awarded more than \$211 million. Funds raised from the first SightFirst Campaign are now exhausted, thus the immediate need for Campaign SightFirst II.

A grant for \$3.1 million was awarded to the Lions of Ethiopia and The Carter Center. The grant covers two years of trachoma control activities (starting September 2007) and one year of onchocerciasis control activities (starting September 2008).


The Amhara region of Ethiopia is ground zero for trachoma, a painful and potentially blinding disease. More than 10 million Ethiopians have trachoma. The grant from LCIF will ensure that trachoma initiatives continue in the area where it's needed most.

"Rest assured of our full strength on the implementation of this project. Our goal is to fight a great battle against trachoma," said Lion Tebebe Y. Berhan, grant administrator in Ethiopia.

The Lions-Carter Center SightFirst Initiative is a six-year partnership with \$16.2 million in direct funding from LCIF. With the recent grant, Lions and The Carter Center will continue to fight onchocerciasis and trachoma in Africa and Latin America in collaboration with OEPA (the Onchocerciasis Elimination Program for the Americas) and APOC (the African Program of Onchocerciasis Control). Thanks largely to this collaboration, significant progress has been made toward lessening the burden of these diseases.

"As a fellow Lion, I want to tell you how proud I am of your success. This has been one of the most gratifying partnerships of my life," said former U.S. President and Nobel Laureate Jimmy Carter, referring to Lions and SightFirst at Lions' 2007 international convention.

Nine of the grants approved are for cataract screening camps and surgeries, enabling Lions in India, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Kenya and Guatemala to provide 108,500 cataract surgeries to the underserved in the community who so desperately need this sight-restoring surgery. Through SightFirst funding, 7.3 million cataract surgeries have been conducted.

Lions Make The 'Magic Glasses' Possible

typical three-year-old, Cross Burchett loves playing board games and putting together dinosaur puzzles and listens intently to the bedtime stories read by his parents in Windsor, Colorado.

When a permission slip came home from the day care center for a vision screening provided free by Lions, his parents quickly consented but had no reason to be concerned about his vision. So they were surprised to learn that the screening indicated Cross may be highly farsighted and that an eye doctor visit was recommended.

At the local eye doctor, Cross didn't pay attention. When the eye doctor asked him to describe pictures on a wall 10 feet away, he didn't respond. The eye doctor gave up and referred Cross to a pediatric doctor as an "unresponsive child." On the ride home, Kerri, his mother, asked why he wouldn't describe the pictures, and Cross told her that he couldn't see them

The Burchetts never realized their son was using one eye because of the extreme blurriness in the other eye. The day care never saw any problems either. Without the Preschool Vision Screening Program, Cross and many other children his age would likely suffer blurred vision well into school age.

"This program is so valuable to the young children of our community and will always continue to help with early vision testing," said Kerri. "We are so thankful for the Lions club program. We wish that members of the Lions club could have been there when glasses were first put on Cross and he looked up at my husband and said, 'Daddy, you are so big ... I can see you.' Or on the drive home when he looked out the window and said, 'The trees have pokey things on them!' He saw the branches on the evergreen trees. And when he stared so intently at his sister's face with a look of amazement.

"His world is a new clear world thanks to your organization. Words cannot express our gratitude for the program and we hope that you continue helping children just like Cross."

The Burchetts' story recently appeared on the ABC evening news in Colorado. During the taping, Cross referred to his glasses as "magic glasses" because they magically made everything around him clear.

Vision problems in young children are not uncommon. Amblyopia, known as "lazy eye," is a leading cause of blindness in children. LCIF's Preschool Vision Screening Program enables Lions to conduct screenings for children to prevent childhood blindness through early detection and treatment for the most common vision disorders that can lead to amblyopia. Unfortunately, too few children are screened before entering school. It is important that vision screenings be done at an early age when treatment is most effective.

Since 1999, the Preschool Vision Screening Program has been one of the LCIF's most popular Core 4 initiatives. Eighteen single and multiple districts in the United States and Multiple District 300 Taiwan have received multi-year Core 4, totaling approximately US\$2.7 million.

Through the program, Lions are able to establish partnerships with medical centers and state health departments to make preschool vision screening successful long-term. Well-trained Lions volunteers screen children ages one through five years old. All results are tracked through statewide databases, making follow-up of referrals possible. Referred children see eye care professionals in their community and follow-up results are than returned to the administrative office.

Lions' volunteers have screened 651,701 children since the program's inception. The overall referral rate is six percent and 65 percent of the children referred had a factor that could cause amblyopia. These results demonstrate the true success of the program.

In partnership with the Independent Living Residences for Deafblind in Ontario (ILRDBO), Canadian Hearing Society (CHS) and Lions Homes for Deaf People (LHDP) workshop participants learned of the challenges facing those who are deafblind, simple sign language techniques and recent achievements in communication technology. A group breakout format gave all in attendance the opportunity to learn and fully understand the daily experiences of deafblind individuals. LHDP Secretary Lion Gary Martins thanked all for attending and applauded the organizing groups for their informative and interesting presentations. Following the Workshop a "backyard" dedication ceremony was held at Lions-Mercel House, ILRDBO newest group home in London, Ontario. ILRDBO homes supports the independent living of adults with deaf-blindness. The homes ensure that a supportive environment is provided for people with congenital or early adventitious deafblindness and who can continue to learn and grow with Intervention. ILRDBO currently have a number of homes in York Region, Simcoe County and South Western Ontario. Lions Homes for Deaf People is proud to be a partner and supporter of ILRDBO. ILRDBO representative, Ms. Joosse Quinn presented a plaque to LHDP Chairperson, Lion Jack Graydon thanking the entire Lions Family for their generous support and assistance with Mercel House.

The Canadian Hearing Society was also in attendance and Katherine Hesson-Bolton provided an update on recent CHS activities. Coming soon are Communication Devices & Accessibility Centres in Barrie, Belleville, Guelph, North Bay and Peel/Halton/Dufferin. The CDAC facilities provide one-stop shopping for all communication needs. CHS and LHDP are valued partners in the CDAC project.

Highlights of the September 2007 Meeting of the Governors Council

The first meeting of the 2007-2008 Council of Governors was held in Markham on Saturday September 15, 2007. The following represents the highlight topics discussed during the meeting:

Treasurer – It was agreed that a revised letter will be sent to all clubs notifying them of the required adjustment of the initial per capita dues invoice sent by MDA; from \$14.00 to \$14.50 (\$14.50 is the actual MDA dues amount).

Administration – During the MDA budget deliberations it was noted that some of the committee job descriptions were somewhat vague it terms of responsibilities and allowable expenses. A review will be undertaken to rectify this issue.

Promotion – The Promotion Committee has been tasked with proposing options for the Parade of Flags Ceremony at MDA Conventions. This will include the development of a DVD containing all flags, similar to that DVD used by LCI. Other items under review are the possibility of changing the venue for the MDA Hospitality suite and the MDA Breakfasts at International Conventions.

Convention Advisory – An exciting program for the 2008 MDA Convention in Toronto has been developed and the planning for the 2009 convention in North Bay is well underway. It was mentioned that a bid to host the 2010 convention had not yet been received.

Hearing Conservation – District A3 is developing a new Digital Hearing Testing Project which can be implemented in conjunction with Vision Screening.

Historian – Governors approved the conversion of all the old MDA meeting hard copy minutes

currently in storage in Tillsonburg into an electronic format with search capabilities.

International Advisory Committee The International Guest at the MDA 2008 Convention will be 1st VP Al Brandel. Upon the committee's recommendation the Governor's endorsed PID Sid Scruggs III as their choice for 2nd VP for 2008-2009. The IAC was appointed to oversee the proceedings for the International Director candidates at the MDA Convention. The IAC also suggested that consideration should be given to reviewing the value of the MDA LION Magazine over the International edition.

MedicAlert Program – PID Terry Graham has been appointed as the Canadian coordinator for this nationally approved joint MedicAlert/Lions program. Approximately 10% of children in each school between the ages of 6 to 14 would benefit through the wearing of the bracelet. This would be a high profile initiative for Lions through the sponsorship of these children. Each would wear a MedicAlert bracelet and each bracelet would have the Lion' logo imprinted in it. An announcement by the Prime Minister to kick off this program is expected sometime in October. More information will follow.

Lions Foundation of Canada - This Lion's year also marks the 25th Anniversary Year of the Foundation. A Light the Path of Darkness special fund raising project was announced for the occasion where special energy efficient light bulbs are being offered for sale by Lions at the cost of \$9 for a package of two. A club can become a 100% contributing club if each member sells 5 packages of two bulbs.

LION Magazine – Due to the increasing costs in producing the magazine and the lowering of the LCI subsidy brought about by the family

membership program, the committee is looking at a number of options which will either lower costs and/or increase revenues. Two of the options under consideration are the use of bulk mailings to clubs (instead of the current individual mailing) and the conversion to the LCI International edition.

MERL - The following is an example of the training opportunities available within the 2007-2008 MERL training program: Nov 3-4, Canadian Lion's Summit in Brantford; Nov 9-11, Training Workshop for District MERL Teams at Camp Dorset; Jan 23-27 Regional Lions Institute in Newmarket (4 spots per district are being reserved). In addition a number of extension workshops throughout the multiple district are being planned.

Sight Conservation – MDA presented a cheque at Lake Jo's Lions Appreciation Day in the amount of \$19,600. This was down from the \$27,000 donated in 2005-2006. The Canadian Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center (CLERC) is an organization that provides collection boxes for used eye glasses. It enables Lions to ship glasses free of charge to Calgary by contacting the local United Van Lines office.

CSF II – It was highlighted that only 288 days remained in this program and while, world wide over \$108M had been raised to date there is still much work to do to reach the final goal. The amount raised so far has enabled over 211,000 people throughout the world to have had their sight saved. It was emphasized that donations from MDA to LCIF are considerably lower than the grants received.


Classic Golf Tourney

They were in a place of honour...and the Mayor presented me with certificates for us to bring home for DHL, BIC, Spirituelle Divas, Office Depot, Pencils for Kids...Thomas Cook, etc...and also told me that all of those are now officially registered as HONORARY CITIZENS of Libore!!! How amazing is that!!

After the opening, we drove right to the hospital where it was Ed's turn to take the helm. They had the boxes waiting for us at the hospital outside, and the Hospital Director, head ophthalmologist and President were all there to meet with Ed. They would love if a few doctors could come for a week and operate every day...and also do some teaching...and help with medicine and equipment. Car Wash





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
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Golf Ball Draw
