AUDIT COMMITTEE

- Received a preliminary draft of The International Associations of Lions Clubs audited financial statements and report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022.
- Received an updated risk assessment, internal audit plan, and internal audit overview presentation from staff.

CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

- Reinstated Lion Sree Vidhya as district governor for the remainder of the 2022-2023 year and prohibit removal of any current district cabinet members without a majority vote of the district governor, first vice district governor and second vice district governor.
- Confirmed action of Dr. Anono Dodzi Komlan related to LCIF grant funds as conduct unbecoming a Lion and prohibited membership as a Lion in the future.
- Confirmed willful failure of Roland Dunham to comply with association policy as conduct unbecoming a Lion and prohibited membership as a Lion in the future.
- Cancelled the charter of the New London Black Heritage Lions Club for failing to meet the obligations of a Lions club.
- Required clubs in the undistricted area of northern Cyprus to confirm they will not associate with an unauthorized "federation" on or before November 30, 2022 and confirmed failure to comply will result in club cancellation.
- Affirmed a proposed amendment to the International By-Laws, Article II, Section 3 to remove the requirement of a district to have 35

clubs and 1,250 members in order to be eligible to endorse a candidate.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE

- Discussed and approved per diem allocations for Presidential Convention Appointees who qualify for reimbursement and headquarter staff supporting the Lions Clubs International Convention.
- Discussed and approved the 2023 Line of March for the Parade of Nations.

- Reviewed and approved updating Chapter VIII

- Discussed how recommendations from the marketing think tank can be incorporated into marketing and leadership development plans.

MARKETING COMMITTEE

- Received updates on strategic messaging guidelines, use cases, brand guidelines, communication plans, digital and commercial promotions, including the new "Lions International" commercial in development.
- Reviewed the Vital Directory publication and approved a series of format adjustments. Further, requested staff evaluate moving the publication to a digital product in the future.
- · Reviewed and approved updates to website navigation to increase menu usability and the ability for members to find the content they seek on lionsclubs.org.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

- · Discussed discounted member types, and requested language be drafted to amend policy preventing discounted member types be used to influence elections through the delegate formula.
- Approved the slate of 2023-2025 Leo Club Program advisory panelists, noting vacancies would be filled at the March 2023 board meeting.
- · Cancelled the clubs formed in June 2021 for election purposes in district 3234 D2.
- Placed district 3234 D2 in a moratorium, preventing elections until membership misuse is resolved through the guidance of a Coordinating
- · Reiterated that clubs must be formed within a district, and all the members of the club must belong to the same district.
- · Discussed options to explore to further encourage new club chartering.
- Updated Leo Club Program policy to align policy with current business practices.
- Removed the requirement for district approval when two or more clubs cosponsor a Leo club. This aligns approval requirements for cosponsored clubs to be the same as Leo clubs with a single Lions club sponsor.
- · Corrected board policy from CMNI (Saipan) to CNMI (Saipan).

SERVICE ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

Resolved to adopt Lions KidSight USA as a service program of Lions Clubs International.

• Received a report on service reporting, including the number of people served, the number of service activities, and the percent of

- clubs reporting service.
- · Received an update on advocacy initiatives, including Lions Day with the United Nations, Lions Day on Capitol Hill and Parliament Hill, and a marketing and advocacy campaign in development by the Lions Council of India.
- · Discussed global causes and service programs, including support for refugees and displaced persons.

preliminary steps to completing District Goals.

The Global Leadership Team is very pleased to announce that the grant application to hold a virtual Regional Lions Leadership Institute for MDA has been successful.

The suggested audience is for Lions who are ready to pursue leadership roles within their clubs and districts. The on-line Institute will be held on Saturday, February 24th, 2023, and Saturday, March 4th, 2023. Applications are due by Friday, January 20th, 2023. Please note that District Governors are requested to endorse the applicants from the District and forward the applications to PCC Tim Cheung.

GLOBAL MEMBERSHIP TEAM

The Multiple District membership trend is encouraging – our net membership growth has remained positive since the start of the current year. As of November 8th, 2022, MDA had a net membership growth of +66 members, compared to 31 in the same period last year. Year to date, the Multiple District has added an impressive 589 new members. However, our corresponding drops remain high at 523 members.

We remain at four (4) new clubs having been added YTD, and four (4) clubs having disbanded.

We continue to lose Leos. YTD, we have lost 75 Leos which is an unwelcome trend.

YTD, one (1) Omega Leo Club has been chartered and two clubs cancelled (one Alpha & one Omega).

The Multiple District successfully applied and received a PR Grant from LCI worth US\$15,000. A meeting was held with all Districts attending to explain the funding criteria and how applications from Districts will be processed.

Let us keep up the momentum. We can end the year with a positive membership growth!




Fowlers Corners Lions Melvin Jones Fellowship

Kindness is contagious

More than 11,000 screened for diabetes in Jakarta, Indonesia

In Indonesia, more than 19 million people between the ages of 20 to 70 live with diabetes, according to the International Diabetes Federation. More than 70 percent of those people are undiagnosed.

Some of the consequences for living with undiagnosed and unmanaged diabetes include blindness, kidney failure, amputations, nerve damage, and heart disease.

Lions across District 307-A1 Indonesia decided to prevent these life-threatening consequences by screening more than 11,000 people in their community for diabetes and raising awareness about the chronic health condition.

With support from a US \$23,248 Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) Diabetes grant, Lions of District 307-A1 were able to expand and equip the Siti Mariam Health Facility in West Jakarta to combat the numbers of people living with undiagnosed diabetes, as well as help those living with diabetes to manage their condition.

"If diabetes is not treated, it can ruin your life. And if it impacts the head of household, then you are talking about the lives of an entire family," says Lion Jessie Budiman, grant administrator of the project.

For example, Budiman says, if a father can't work anymore because he lost his eyesight or his leg was amputated because of undiagnosed diabetes, then the whole family is affected.

More than a decade ago, Budiman's parents, Henie and Anwar Budiman, both physicians, helped establish the Siti Mariam Health Facility with the support of Lions in West Jakarta. And now, 13 years later, Lions expanded the facility to include diabetes management and prevention.

"I feel diabetes is one of the strongest causes of

LCIF because it is something that you can actually manage. You don't have to live with the complications of diabetes. You can manage it," Budiman says "It's about catching it on time, before it's too late. And that is what we hope our center can provide."

Funds from the grant enabled Lions to purchase HbA1c test strips, blood glucose test strips, lancets, latex gloves, and stipends for medical personnel. Lions involved in the project, many who are medical professionals, screened more than 11,000 residents with the paper-based risk assessment, almost 9,000 people with the blood glucose test—all at no charge.

"I didn't know I had a blood glucose level that is very high," says one beneficiary. But thanks to Lions, the doctor explained to me what I can do to lower it."

Originally, the Lions only planned to screen 5,000 people, but with the help of more than 700 Lions in the district, they doubled their goal by the end of the project.

"That is the thing that I love most about Lions," she says. "Kindness is contagious in Lions. When we have a good project, everyone wants to take part in it."

Members of the Almaguin Highlands Lions Club don't mind getting down and dirty for a good cause.

The club, based in Strong Township, Ontario hosts an annual bush race every August at Copeman Tree Farms in Sundridge, Ontario.

"Past district Governor Bill Copeman owns the land and graciously lets me dig big holes for water and mud," says Jocelyn Modl, charter president and current club president.

Those words "mud," "water," and "holes" should be signs that this 5K obstacle run is no ordinary race. It's a bush races that draws 150 adults and children who use their muscle and willpower to conquer more than 15 obstacles and challenges on a course that features mud - lots of mud - along with an axe throw, archery, climbing walls, Tarzan ropes, cargo net, and tractor tires to scramble over, up, down, under, or through.

"Our race is a true bush race, which is fun for racers, because once you leave the start line, you head up into the trees and spectators don't see you again

until you come back out," Modl says.

And it's a sure bet you'll come back muddy after tackling the course's varied terrain of hills, groomed farm trails and rugged bush.

Proving that the organizers, which includes about 25 to 30 volunteers, have a sense of humor, the club posts signs throughout the course to keep participants smiling.

"Our rope wall has a sign that says "Don't worry, Humpty Dumpty had wall problems, too," says Modl. "After the racers come up the first big hill, there is another sign that says, "If you're feeling it now, you're in trouble later."

Modl says it is inevitable that participants, who are both trained and amateur athletes, will build camaraderie as they complete the course.

"The camaraderie comes between each racer, as both friends and strangers conquer these obstacles together," Modl says. "It's natural if you're crawling through the mud, falling in the mud, pulling your best friend through the mud, losing your shoe, getting into extremely cold water, or holding your husband's legs as he scrambles across the monkey rings that he hasn't practiced doing since elementary school."

The race, which is the club's one big fundraiser, brings in roughly CAD\$4,000 (US\$3,200) that goes

to wherever there is a need in the community. In the past the club has supplied free athletic equipment to local schools, donated to Christmas Cheer baskets for families in need during the holidays, donated to food banks, and provided free hockey clinics for children.

Modl says racers often thank the club for organizing the event because they never thought they'd be able to complete something like it.

Finishing the course while having fun is an accomplishment and the effect of taking on such a challenge lasts long past race day.

"When racers finish, they are instantly empowered to take on the next challenge in their lives because they just did things that they never thought they could do, or would have even tried doing without signing up," Modl says. "Now they have the courage to tackle whatever life throws at them."

A Smile for Sight

Sight is one of our most valuable senses. It allows us to connect with the moments in life and with each other.

After a premature birth, twins Kaya and Alime were both diagnosed with an eye disease called retinopathy of prematurity, and they needed treatment to protect their sight and prevent blindness.

Their parents, Ibrahim and Nilufer, traveled more than an hour and half from their home to the city of Izmir, Turkey, to find help for their children. Thanks to care provided by ophthalmologists at the first and only children's hospital in the country, Kaya's treatment is completed, and he is healthy. Alime continues treatment at the hospital.

The twins are only two examples of more than 15,000 children that will benefit from the Izmir Pergamon Lions Club's sight project annually from support from Lions in District 118R and a Matching grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF).

When Lions in Turkey heard that the ophthalmology clinic in their community needed additional equipment, they turned to LCIF for help, and were awarded a Matching grant for US\$10,050. With the grant funds, Lions purchased advanced eye equipment to help determine the eye health of children and infants.

The clinic is located at the Izmir Dr. Behcet Child Disease and Pediatric Surgery Training and Research Hospital, the first and only children's hospital in Turkey. The hospital opened in the 1940s and serves the entire Aegean Region, which is about a quarter of the population of the country.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, many of the neighboring adult hospitals focused on caring for COVID-19 patients, increasing the demand on the children's

hospital. Children's more frequent use of tablets and phone screens during the pandemic also increased vision problems. With more children having blurred vision, additional equipment was needed to meet the community's needs.

Through the project, Lions in Izmir also raised awareness about the importance of regular eye checkups for infants and children.

"Eye health is underestimated around the world, and the necessary precautions for preventable visual impairments are unfortunately not sufficient," says Faika Evrim Uysal, executive project manager. "As Lions clubs, we take this matter very seriously. Sometimes a project can do many things to help raise awareness and protect and improve more people's eye health."

Helping support children's eye care is essential because the deterioration of children's eye health can impact their success in school and future.

Starting in the fall of 2022 school season in Turkey, Lions and ophthalmologists will start screening eyes with the grant-supported portable eye equipment in schools and orphanages. If the screening indicates a child needs advanced care, they will be referred to a health care provider.

"In order to make our communities healthier, more conscious, more sustainable, and happier, as Districts 118 R Lions, we undertake life-changing projects for infants', children's, and women's health; and we do all of this together," says Teoman Akcali, immediate past district governor.

Lions in Izmir call the project SMILE because they are determined to make someone smile by helping give the power of sight and hope to expand the project in the future. For the project, Lions even created a special mascot, called Lionopticool, a small-stuffed Lion, to help make children more comfortable during a vision screening.

Ever since Helen Keller inspired Lions to champion the cause against avoidable blindness in 1925, Lions and Leos have served and advocated for the blind and visually impaired. Worldwide, about 2.2 billion people have a vision impairment.

At least 1 billion of those cases could have been prevented, according to the World Health Organization.

Nearly a century later, this long-standing mission continues.



skaters. Lions have sponsored Frost in many competitions. He has been a Lion for over 15 years and recently received his membership chevron from Club President Sylvie Blanchette.


